
## FOUR FREEDOMS PARK CONSERVANCY ANNOUNCES MONUMENTAL ILLUMINATED MESSAGE STARTING AUGUST 14: "SOCIAL SECURITY: YOU EARNED IT"

AARP Sponsors Weeklong Effort to Highlight the Importance of President Franklin D. Roosevelt's 1935 Social Security Act on its 88th Anniversary



August 14, 2023, New York -- To mark the 88th anniversary of President Franklin D. Or course, the act was both hailed and criticized for its progressive nature, which did not necessarily endear the President to friends and family. And let us also all remember that Social Security stands as the true achievement of then Secretary of Labor Frances Perkins, the first woman to be appointed as United States Cabinet Secretary."

New York City, in its grandeur, was the biggest beneficiary of the New Deal public works. Viewing of the illumination is best from New York City's Midtown East and along the FDR Drive from the United Nations to the Ed Koch Bridge.

## Four Facts About the Importance of Social Security

- Nearly one in five New York residents 3,680,264 people received Social Security income as of last year, injecting more than \$64.3 billion into the state's economy.
- The average retired New Yorker on Social Security received about \$19,100 a year in 2022.
- Nationally, nearly one in five U.S. residents 65 million people received Social Security income as of last year, injecting more than \$1.1 trillion into the national economy.
- The average retired American on Social Security received about \$18,530 a year in 2022.
  42% of Americans 65 and older live in families that rely on Social Security for at least half of their income; 20% live in families that rely on the program for at least 90 percent of their income.
